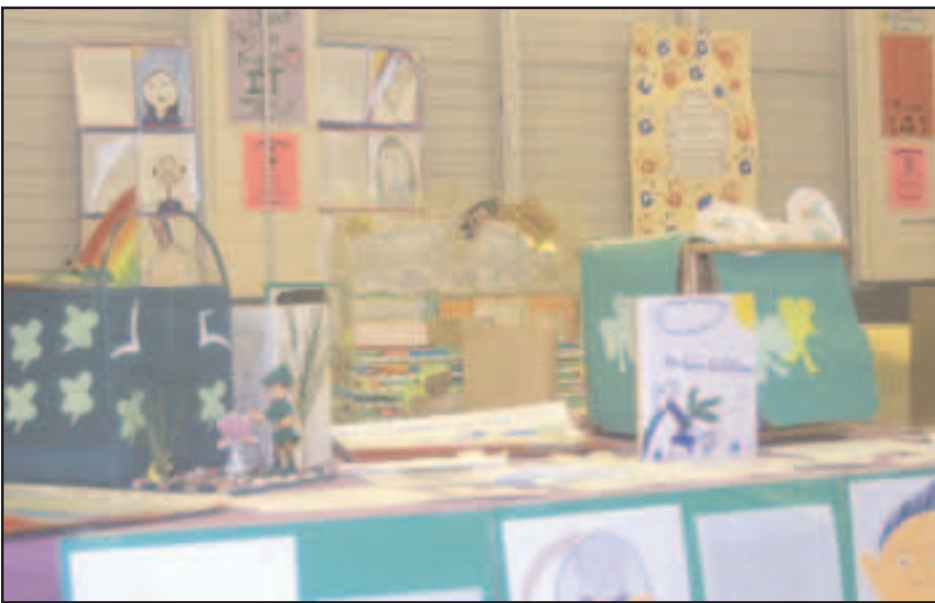


Kaunakakai Festival of Learning

The Kaunakakai Elementary School held the annual Festival of Learning and Ho'olaule'a in April, featuring displays of student and teachers' work. Mr. O'Brien's 5th grade class participated in Project Kahea Loko and studied ahupua'a with focus on fishponds. Meeting education standards, students used unifying concepts and themes, they displayed models of different fishponds. The examples of their work demonstrated meeting the education benchmark: To observe and describe how parts influence one another in a system.

Third grade students of Kumu Will and Mrs. Jenkins planned, drafted, revised, edited and published short stories describing a fun theme of "Leprechaun Traps." The 3rd graders used writing strategies to construct meaning to communicate effectively as they described the planning and construction of their "Leprechaun Traps."

Outside the display area, the ho'olaulea included entertainment by ukulele and hula classes from the 21st Century Grant Learning Center, Melveen Leed and others. The Car Show featured restored classics and newer hot cars. Plants, a Book Fair, a rummage sale, arts and crafts, and lots of kid-favorite food & games brought fundraising and the community together.



WACO 1993: Murder by Government

April 19, 1993, agents from BATF/FBI, utilizing military hardware laid siege to the Davidian's Church and dwellings which resulted in the deaths of 87 American citizens. Most of the victims were unarmed old men, women, and small children.

President Clinton's AG Janet Reno had no concern for the lives or welfare of tiny children who she ordered to be gassed, burned, shot and crushed by ATF/FBI/Military with machine gun fire directed on the Mount Carmel church from helicopters.

A jury rejected murder charges against 11 surviving Davidians, apparently concluding that they had acted in self-defense. We spoke in the jury room about the fact that the wrong people were on trial, that it should have been the ones that planned the raid and orchestrated it and insisted on carrying out this plan."

Kualapu'u Public Conversion Charter School Update

Much has been going on behind the scenes with Kualapu'u School's becoming a charter school in June 2004. The Kualapu'u School Local Advisory Panel representing all segments of the school community has been established. The members are (Parent Reps)--Dean Chow, Kanani Costales, Barbara Kalipi (LAP Chair), Debbie Naeole, Jane Woosley; (Teacher Reps)--Leila Elia, Kimberly Johnston (LAP Secretary), Kamalu Poepoe; Support Staff Reps--Linda Reyes, Kimberly Rosa, Carolyn Bush (missing from photo); Community Reps--Ron Kimball (LAP Vice-Chair) Judy Mikami, and Moses Kim; Administration--Lydia Trinidad.

Since its creation in November 2004, the LAP has participated in a statewide charter school conference and is currently participating in legislative efforts that support charter schools. The LAP also approved its by-laws, a working budget for the 2005-2006 school year and job descriptions for new positions at the school--a School Family Facilitator and School Business Manager. The LAP has agreed to conduct a school organizational audit beginning next school year as the way for the school to find out how to better serve the educational the needs of the students, parents, and community.

The Ho'okoko'o Board of Directors (our Local School Board) and the Hawaii State Teacher Association have ratified a teacher contract agreement for the 2005-2007 school years. All public charter schools enjoy the opportunity for increased flexibility to meet student needs. Charter schools also must continue to meet all state and federal requirements on health and safety, collective bargaining, and federal No Child Left Behind.

Maunaloa School elementary school students about life aboard a sailing canoe, one





S.147 - ? Blood quantum ?**

After more than 30 years of congressional denial, "not in the mood" along with state government creative deception, Haunani Apoliona, chairwoman of OHA, makes the silly remark, "the sovereignty issue has been drifting."

Since 1959, our longtime politicians have not only miserably failed in their "trust responsibility" but this has been a system reaping with corruption and incompetents.

If it were not for Rice v. Cayetano there would be no effort for the so-called, "Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act of 2005."

Nevertheless, let us look at the facts about S.147. Beginning with its phony purpose, through the various versions, to its present form, four things never changed in this scam.

- 1) Congressional Findings; indigenous Hawaiian s meet the criteria of recognition.
- 2) A new "Native Hawaiian governing entity" with procedures established and approved by our "apologetic" thief.
- 3) Definition of Native Hawaiian that has zero blood quantum.
- 4) Authorizes and direct the new "Native Hawaiian Governing entity" in settling indigenous Hawaiian land claims.

According to the 2000 U.S. Census figures, there were 402,000 people in the United States claiming Native Hawaiian ancestry, and of this figure, 142 claimed only Native Hawaiian ancestry.

The scheme of potential members in the new "Native Hawaiian Governing entity" is now thousands of times greater, than the 6,800 indigenous Hawaiian living on Hawaiian homesteads. A waiting list of 18,000, where many have been waiting for over 35 years.
