Kamehameha Schools' Appeals to Keep Race-Based Admission Policy

On a Sunday afternoon following the 9th Circuit Court's decision against the race based admission policy in Hawaii, Kamehameha Schools CEO D.J. Miller and Trustee Douglas Ing explained to a Molokai audience their legal process attempting to retain the race-based school policy that excludes non-Hawaiian students from admission to the Kamehameha Schools.

Kamehameha alumni and students were assured that the School would be appealing the decision first to the full 9th

Circuit Court, then to the United States Supreme Court if needed.

For the benefit of MAN readers, following is the Kamehameha Schools section of the Will of Bernice Pauahi Bishop 1883: "Thirteenth. I give, devise and bequeath all of the rest, residue and remainder of my estate real and personal, wherever situated unto the trustees below named, their heirs and assigns forever, to hold upon the following trusts, namely: to erect and maintain in the Hawaiian Islands two schools, each for boarding and day scholars, one for boys and one for girls, to be known as, and called the Kamehameha Schools.

I direct my trustees to expend such amount as they may deem best, not to exceed however one-half of the fund which may come into their hands, in the purchase of suitable premises, the erection of school buildings, and in furnishing the same with the necessary and appropriate fixtures furniture and apparatus.

I direct my trustees to invest the remainder of my estate in such manner as they may think best, and to expend the annual income in the maintenance of said schools; meaning thereby the salaries of teachers, the repairing buildings and other incidental expenses; and to devote a portion of each years income to the support and education of orphans, and others in indigent circumstances, giving the preference to Hawaiians of pure or part aboriginal blood; the proportion in which said annual income is to be divided among the various objects above mentioned to be determined solely by my said trustees they to have full discretion.

I desire my trustees to provide first and chiefly a good education in the common English branches, and also instruction in morals and in such useful knowledge as may tend to make good and industrious men and women; and I desire instruction in the higher branches to be subsidiary to the foregoing objects."—Bernice Pauahi Bishop 1883

[Editor's challenge: I defy anyone to show where she intended to create and perpetuate a legacy of race-based general admission policy. No way. The Trustees are making lawyers rich, instead of building more classrooms for more students. It seems clear to me that Trustees have corrupted Pauahi's legacy of love to Hawaii's children. If they want a race-based private school, regardless of Pauahi's will, give up Tax Exempt. Better yet, respect her will and provide more classrooms for more students—The MAN]

• In Hawaii, 1 in 7 people has or may have kidney disease. This is 30% higher than the national average. • Many people do not know they have kidney disease until it is severe. • Kidney disease is a silent killer. There are no signs or symptoms until 70% of kidney function is lost. • When kidney disease progresses, it can eventually lead to kidney failure and a need for dialysis or a kidney transplant.

EARLY DETECTION & TREATMENT

To identify those at risk for chronic kidney disease, the National Kidney Foundation of Hawaii has an early intervention screening program called the Kidney Early Evaluation Program, or KEEP for short. At this free in-depth screening, participants have their blood and urine tested, and they receive an appraisal by medical professionals. In Hawaii, those of Native Hawaiian, Japanese and Filipino ethnicity are most at risk.

A "KEEP" is scheduled for this week on Molokai. Displays and literature on chronic kidney disease (CKD), NKFH and medical volunteers will provide the screening and testing procedures. Auntie Harriett and her annual flower bouquets were welcomed by hospital staff including Tessie Piza, who worked with Auntie Harriett in Central Supply, administrator Janice Kalanihuia and Dr. Emmett Aluli.

Just past the mural of Kaunakakai, the door leading to the new hospital wing opens to the new urgent care waiting room. The former hospital lobby was brightened with Auntie Harriett's tribute to the hospital she "very much loves."
